MANAGER'S REPORT

FUND OBJECTIVE AND POLICY

What is the investment objective of the Fund?

The Fund aims to achieve consistent capital growth over the medium to long-term.

Has the Fund achieved its objective?

For the financial year under review, the Fund did not achieve its objectives as stated under the Fund investment policy largely due to the unfavourable macro environment. However, since inception, the Fund has met its objective by delivering a 6.38% annualised total return.

What are the Fund investment policy and principal investment strategy?

The Fund may invest a minimum of 70% and up to a maximum of 98% of its Net Asset Value ("NAV") principally in Shariah-compliant equities aimed to provide growth and up to 28% of its NAV in other permissible Shariah-compliant investments, such as Sukuk with a minimum credit rating of "A3" or "P2" by RAM Rating Services Berhad ("RAM") or equivalent rating by Malaysian Rating Corporation Berhad ("MARC") or by local rating agency(ies) of the country of issuance; or "BBB-" by Standard & Poor's ("S&P") or equivalent rating by any other international rating agencies. The Fund may also opt to seek investment exposure via Islamic collective investment scheme that is in line with the Fund's objective, subject to the requirements of the Guidelines on Unit Trust Funds ("GUTF"). In line with its objective, the investment strategy and policy of the Fund is to rebalance the portfolio to suit market conditions in order to reduce short-term volatility and provide consistency in capital growth. With effect from 28 April 2023, the Fund may invest up to 25% of its NAV in any eligible market globally with some operations or businesses in Malaysia to capture growth opportunities

The asset allocation strategy for this Fund is as follows:

- between 70% to 98% (both inclusive) of the Fund's NAV will be invested in Shariah-compliant equities;
- up to 28% of the Fund's NAV in other permissible Shariah-compliant investments; and
- at least 2% of the Fund's NAV will be invested in Islamic liquid assets.

What was the net income distribution for the financial year ended 31 May 2023?

The Fund distributed a total net income of RM7.52 million to the unit holders. As a result, the NAV per unit dropped from RM0.8605 to RM0.8563 on 10 Nov 2022 for the financial year ended 31 May 2023.

MARKET REVIEW (1 JUNE 2022 TO 31 MAY 2023)

For the financial year under review, the FTSE Bursa Malaysia EMAS Shariah Index ("FBMS") declined by 7.85% from 11,509.63 points ("pts") to 10,606.51 pts.

FBMS Index started the period under review on a losing note, losing 1,005.66 pts or 8.74% in June 2022 alone, triggered by the release of the US May inflation data with the Consumer Price Index ("CPI") at 8.6% which was a fresh 40-year high and renewed fears that the US Federal Reserve (the "Fed") could over-tighten and landing the world's largest economy into a recession. Commodities-related stocks were the most battered – Energy (-17%), Plantations (-13%) – while Gloves also languished.

FBMS Index rebounded 230.8 pts or 2.2% to 10,734.77 pts in July 2022, mainly on the back of easing inflation concerns and rising hopes that a hard landing of the US economy may be avoided. The compression in bond yields also raised the appeal of equities, especially growth stocks. Gainers were relatively broad-based but Technology (+6%), Telecommunications (+4%) and Consumer (+3%) led gains, while Glove stocks continued to languish despite the World Health Organizations ("WHO") declaring the rapidly spreading Monkeypox a global health emergency and the resurgence of Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("COVID-19") cases.

FBMS Index extended gains, up 78.7 pts or 0.7% to 10,81346 pts in August 2022. Sentiment was earlier lifted by a cooler US inflation print of 8.5% in July 2022 vs 9.1% in the previous month, but subsequently dented by comments from Jerome Powell at Jackson Hole that the fight against inflation was not over and the Fed will continue to hike interest rates to cool the economy further. Commodities (Energy +9%, Plantations +3%), Utilities (+4%) and Telecommunications (+3%) gained at the expense of Technology (-4%) and Healthcare (-10% mainly Gloves).

FBMS Index slumped 805.4 pts or 7.5% to 10,008 pts in September 2022. Markets reeled from renewed fears of a global recession stoked by the ever-so-hawkish Fed which remained adamant about sustaining hikes to cool the economy further. The strong US dollar, which is at the strongest it has ever been since 1997 also trigger flows out of emerging markets and commodities. Commodities (Energy -8%, Plantations -10% and metals) and Telecommunications (-7%) were among the key losers, with modest gains seen in Construction (+2%), Transport (+3%) and REITs (+3%).

FBMS Index jumped 403.08 pts or 4.0% to 10,411 pts in October 2022 in tandem with the rebound in global and regional markets. Investors shrugged off recent hot inflation print and strong employment data in the US, and instead focused on pockets of softness in the economy and expect the Fed to ease off its aggressive rate hikes soon. Recent corporate earnings in the US were also quite robust, albeit glaring weakness in some of the Technology giants. Consequently, the US dollar strength waned and treasury yields compressed, helping Emerging Market ("EM") flows and currencies.

MARKET REVIEW (1 JUNE 2022 TO 31 MAY 2023) (CONTINUED)

Healthcare (+15%; mainly Gloves), Transportations (+12%) and Commodities (Energy +4%, Plantations +6% and metals) and Telecommunications (+4%) were among the key winners for the month. The optimism lasted into November 2022 with FBMS Index extending another 371.98 pts or 3.6% gains to 10,783 pts.

FBMS Index rose 155.46 pts and ended the year at 10,938.55 pts, aided by year-end window-dressing and optimism over China's reopening come 8th January 2023. However, these were negated by renewed fears of a US recession with concerns of inflation staying higher for longer and as the pace of US Fed rate hikes starts taking a toll on the economy. Recent Institute for Supply Management ("ISM") data showed an unexpected rise in services industry in November 2022 while employment and wage growth remain robust, albeit US home prices fell for the fourth month running. Commodities (mainly Plantation +5%), Transportations (+5%; mainly Miscellaneous), Healthcare (+7%) and Utilities (+2%) were among the key gainers for the month, while Technology and Telecommunications languished.

The FBMS Index rallied on during the month of January 2023 gaining 137.65 pts or 1.26% to end the month at 11,076.20 pts despite Malaysia's Purchasing Managers Index ("PMI") declined further from to 46.5 pts from 47.8 pts in December 2022, representing the sixth consecutive month of contraction which contrasted the rest of ASEAN. Bank Negara also surprised with a rate hike pause, holding Opening Price Rate ("OPR") at 2.75%.

In February 2023, The FBMS Index eased 278.53 pts or 2.51%. Investors remained cautious leading up to Budget 2023 while renewed concerns over the Fed staying hawkish given persistent inflation coupled with encouraging consumption and employment data in the US recently further weighed on sentiment. The rebound in the US dollar also took flows out of emerging markets.

FBMS Index fell 81 pts or -0.8%, ending the month of March 2023 at 10,716 pts. Weakness was in line with the sell-off in regional markets as investors aggressively risked off following the collapse of several high-profile banks in the US and Europe, potentially triggering a global liquidity squeeze, and mounting worries that the Fed's aggressive tightening may have finally taken a toll on the US economy. Market however rebounded towards the later part of the month following Fed's decision to go ahead with a 25 bps hike, downplaying fears of a banking contagion and shifting attention back to inflation which has started to ease, albeit very gradually. Commodities were sold down in favor of defensive sectors such as Healthcare and Utilities during the month.

For the month of April 2023, FBMS Index was up 20 pts or +0.19%, ending the month at 10,737 pts. Utilities, Commodities, Telecommunications did well during the month. We have a lower first quarter of 2023 ("1Q23") US Gross Domestic Product ("GDP") print of a mere 1%, down from 2.6% in fourth quarter of 2022 ("4Q22"). US consumer spending remains strong on the back of low unemployment and solid wage gains. CPI cooled to 5% in March 2023, but core Persona Consumption Expenditures ("PCE") picked up from 3.5% in February 2023 to 3.6% in March 2023 no thanks to higher rents. All said, the Fed will likely go ahead with the 25 bps hike in the upcoming Federal Open Market Committee ("FOMC") meeting, and together with tighter credit conditions following recent collapse of several high profile US banks, recession risk runs high.

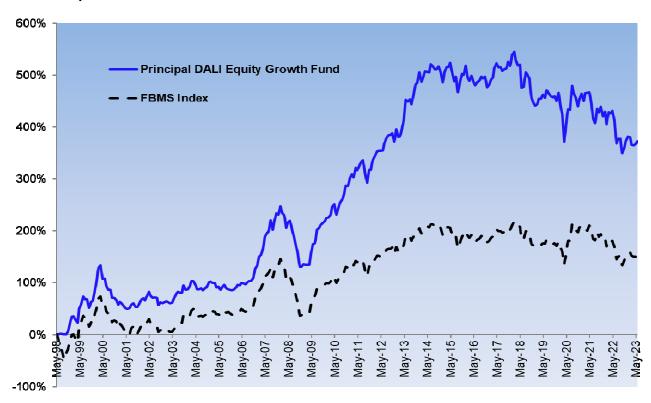
FBMS Index fell 191 pts or -1.8%, ending the month of May 2023 at 10,553.35. The sell-off was relatively broad-based, with select stocks within defensive sectors showing green, and we believe it was largely triggered by the recent weakness of the Ringgit on the back of poor Chinese data and consequently the depreciation of the Chinese Yuan ("CNY"). Further aggravating the situation was the stronger Dollar due to concerns surrounding the US debt ceiling, and recent US data – encouraging payroll and wage, sticky inflation, and more recently a rebound in job openings - stoking bets on further rates hikes in the next FOMC meeting.

Asset allocation decreased from 95.06% as of 31 May 2022 to 92.45% as of 31 May 2023 to reflect our cautious view on the equity market.

MARKET OUTLOOK*

Malaysia's equity market valuations remain extremely compressed with forward price earnings ("P/E") ratio of under 13 times still at over standard deviation below the historical mean. This is based on consensus earnings growth of 9% for 2023 and 6% for 2024. The re-tabled Budget 2023 offered much needed clarity on the new Government's policy posture. Overall, we are encouraged by the non-extension of Prosperity Tax (no derailment of re-acceleration of corporate earnings in 2023), delayed implementation of Goods and Services Tax ("GST") and capital gains tax, and fiscal target discipline. There were also numerous tax incentives to spur Micro, Small & Medium Enterprise ("MSME's") and investments into various high impact sectors. We remain hopeful that elevated risk premiums on Malaysia would abate over time.

INVESTMENT STRATEGY

We prefer to maintain a cautious stance and continue to adopt a barbell strategy, balancing between value and growth, though we see opportunity on selective sectors post the recent market sell-down. We are constructive on domestic-driven sectors, such as Utilities, while we continue to like structural growth themes in selective Technology. Key risks are the derailment of Malaysia's macroeconomic recovery and corporate earnings growth due to the larger-than-expected impact of rising inflation, slower global economic growth, and heightened geopolitical risks.

SOFT COMMISSIONS AND REBATES

Principal Malaysia (the "Manager"), and the Trustee will not retain any form of rebate or otherwise share in any commission with, any broker or dealer in consideration for directing dealings in the investments of the Fund. Accordingly, any rebates or shared commission will be directed to the account of the Fund. We may retain goods and services (soft commission) provided by any broker or dealer if the following conditions are met:

- (a) the soft commission bring direct benefit or advantage to the management of the Fund and may include research and advisory related services;
- (b) any dealings with the broker or dealer is executed on terms which are the most favourable for the Funds; and
- (c) the availability of soft commissions is not the sole or primary purpose to perform or arrange transactions with such broker or dealer, and we will not enter into unnecessary trades in order to achieve a sufficient volume of transactions to qualify for soft commissions.

Opinion

The Trustee is responsible for overseeing the Fund's financial reporting process. The Trustee is also responsible for ensuring that the Manager maintains proper accounting and other records as are necessary to enable true and fair presentation of these financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2023

1. THE FUND, THE MANAGER AND ITS PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

Principal DALI Equity Growth Fund (the "Fund") is governed by a Principal Master Deed dated 15 May 2008, a Fourth Supplemental Master Deed dated 25 June 2008, a Sixth Supplemental Master Deed dated 14 July 2008, a Seventh Supplemental Master Deed dated 19 November 2008, a Fifteenth Supplemental Master Deed dated 21 September 2012, a Seventeenth Supplemental Master Deed dated 25 March 2015 and a Nineteenth Supplemental Master Deed dated 18 June 2019, a Twentythird Supplemental Master Deed dated 27 June 2022, a Twentyfourth Supplemental Master Deed dated 20 September 2022 (collectively referred to as the "Deeds"), made between Principal Asset Management Berhad (the "Manager") and MTrustee Berhad (the "Trustee").

The Fund may invest a minimum of 70% and up to a maximum of 98% of its NAV principally in Shariah-compliant equities aimed to provide growth and up to 28% of its NAV in other permissible Shariah-compliant investments, such as Sukuk with a minimum credit rating of "A3" or "P2" by RAM or equivalent rating by MARC or by local rating agency(ies) of the country of issuance; or "BBB-" by S&P or equivalent rating by any other international rating agencies. The Fund may also opt to seek investment exposure via Islamic collective investment scheme that is in line with the Fund's objective, subject to the requirements of the GUTF. In line with its objective, the investment strategy and policy of the Fund is to rebalance the portfolio to suit market conditions in order to reduce short-term volatility and provide consistency in capital growth. With effect from 28 April 2023, the Fund may invest up to 25% of its NAV in any eligible market globally with some operations or businesses in Malaysia to capture growth opportunities

The asset allocation strategy for this Fund is as follows:

- between 70% to 98% (both inclusive) of the Fund's NAV will be invested in Shariahcompliant equities;
- up to 28% of the Fund's NAV in other permissible Shariah-compliant investments; and
- at least 2% of the Fund's NAV will be invested in Islamic liquid assets.

All investments are subjected to the GUTF, SC requirements, the Deeds, except where exemptions or variations have been approved by the SC, internal policies and procedures and the Fund's objective.

The Fund have issued Replacement Master Prospectus (Islamic Funds) dated 28 April 2023

The Manager is a joint venture between Principal Financial Group®, a member of the FORTUNE 500® and a Nasdaq-listed global financial services and CIMB Group Holdings Berhad, one of Southeast Asia's leading universal banking groups. The principal activities of the Manager are the establishment and management of unit trust funds and fund management activities.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been used consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the financial statements:

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the MFRS as issued by the Malaysian Accounting Standards Board ("MASB") and IFRS as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IASB").

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by financial assets at fair value through profit or loss.

(a) Basis of preparation (Continued)

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with MFRS and IFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reported year.

It also requires the Manager to exercise their judgement in the process of applying the Fund's accounting policies. Although these estimates and assumptions are based on the Manager's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results may differ.

The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed in Note 2(I).

There are no other standards, amendments to standards or interpretations that are effective for financial year beginning on 1 June 2022 that have a material effect on the financial statements of the Fund.

None of the standards, amendments to standards or interpretations that are effective for the financial year beginning on/after 1 June 2023 are applicable to the Fund.

(b) Financial assets and financial liabilities

Classification

The Fund classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- those to be measured subsequently at fair value through profit or loss, and
- those to be measured at amortised cost.

The Fund classifies its investments based on both the Fund's business model for managing those financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets. The portfolio of financial assets is managed, and performance is evaluated on a fair value basis. The Fund is primarily focused on fair value information and uses that information to assess the assets' performance and to make decisions. The Fund has not taken the option to irrevocably designate any equity securities as fair value through other comprehensive income ("OCI").

The contractual cash flows of the Fund's investments in unquoted Sukuk are solely principal and interest¹. However, these securities are neither held for the purpose of collecting contractual cash flows nor held both for collecting contractual cash flows and for sale. The collection of contractual cash flows is only incidental to achieving the Fund's business model's objective. Consequently, the investments in unquoted Sukuk are measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Fund classifies cash and cash equivalents, amount due from stockbrokers, amount due from Manager and dividends receivable as financial assets at amortised cost as these financial assets are held to collect contractual cash flows consisting of the amount outstanding.

All of the Fund's financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost.

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¹ For the purposes of this Fund, interest refers to profits earned from Shariah-compliant investments

(b) Financial assets and financial liabilities (continued)

Recognition and measurement

Regular purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on the trade-date, the date on which the Fund commits to purchase or sell the asset. Transaction costs are expensed in the statement of comprehensive income. Shariah-compliant deposits with licensed Islamic financial institutions are initially recognised at fair value.

Financial instruments are recognised in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Fund becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the Shariah-compliant investments have expired or have been transferred and the Fund has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership.

Financial liabilities are derecognised when it is extinguished, i.e. when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expired.

Unrealised gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value of the financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are presented in the statement of comprehensive income within net gain or loss on financial assets at fair value through profit or loss in the financial year which they arise.

Dividend income from financial assets at fair value through profit or loss is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income as part of gross dividend income when the Fund's right to receive payments is established.

Shariah-compliant quoted securities in Malaysia are valued at the last traded market price quoted on Bursa Malaysia Securities Bhd ("Bursa Securities") at the date of the statement of financial position.

If a valuation based on the market price does not represent the fair value of the Shariah-compliant quoted securities, for example during abnormal market conditions or when no market price is available, including in the event of a suspension in the quotation of the Shariah-compliant quoted securities for a period exceeding 14 days, or such shorter period as agreed by the Trustee, then the Shariah-compliant quoted securities are valued as determined in good faith by the Manager, based on the methods or bases approved by the Trustee after appropriate technical consultation.

Unquoted Sukuk denominated in Malaysian Ringgit ("MYR"/"RM") are revalued on a daily basis based on fair value prices quoted by a Bond Pricing Agency ("BPA") registered with the SC as per the GUTF. Refer to Note 2(I) for further explanation.

Shariah-compliant deposits with licensed Islamic financial institutions are stated at cost plus accrued profit calculated on the effective profit method over the period from the date of placement to the date of maturity of the respective deposits.

Financial assets at amortised cost and other financial liabilities are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective profit method.

(b) Financial assets and financial liabilities (continued)

Impairment for assets carried at amortised costs

The Fund measures credit risk and expected credit losses ("ECL") using probability of default, exposure at default and loss given default. The Manager consider both historical analysis and forward-looking information in determining any ECL. The Manager consider the probability of default to be close to zero as these instruments have a low risk of default and the counterparties have a strong capacity to meet their contractual obligations in the near term. As a result, no loss allowance has been recognised based on 12-month ECL as any such impairment would be wholly insignificant to the Fund.

Significant increase in credit risk

A significant increase in credit risk is defined by the Manager as any contractual payment which is more than 30 days past due.

Definition of default and credit-impaired financial assets

Any contractual payment which is more than 90 days past due is considered credit impaired.

Write-off

The Fund writes off financial assets, in whole or in part, when it has exhausted all practical recovery efforts and has concluded there is no reasonable expectation of recovery. The assessment of no reasonable expectation of recovery is based on unavailability of debtor's sources of income or assets to generate sufficient future cash flows to repay the amount. The Fund may write-off financial assets that are still subject to enforcement activity. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off will result in impairment gains. There are no write-offs/recoveries during the financial year.

(c) Income recognition

Dividend income is recognised on the ex-dividend date when the right to receive payment is established.

Profit income from Shariah-compliant deposits with licensed Islamic financial institutions and unquoted Sukuk are recognised on a time proportionate basis using the effective profit method on an accrual basis.

Profit income is calculated by applying the effective profit rate to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset except for financial assets that subsequently become credit impaired. For credit-impaired financial assets the effective profit rate is applied to the net carrying amount of the financial asset (after deduction of the loss allowance).

Realised gain or loss on disposal of Shariah-compliant quoted securities is accounted for as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of Shariah-compliant quoted securities, determined on a weighted average cost basis.

Realised gain or loss on disposal of unquoted Sukuk is accounted for as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of unquoted Sukuk, determined on cost adjusted for accretion of discount or amortisation of premium.

(d) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of the Fund are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Fund operates (the "functional currency"). The financial statements are presented in MYR, which is the Fund's functional and presentation currency.

(e) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents comprise bank balance and Shariah-compliant deposits held in highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amount of cash and which are subjected to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

(f) Taxation

Current tax expense is determined according to Malaysian tax laws at the current rate based upon the taxable profit earned during the financial year.

Withholding taxes on investment income from Shariah-compliant investment are based on tax regime of the respective countries that the Fund invests in. They are presented within other expenses line in the statement of comprehensive income.

(g) Distribution

A distribution to the Fund's unit holders is accounted for as a deduction from realised reserve. A proposed distribution is recognised as a liability in the financial year in which it is approved by the Trustee.

(h) Transactions costs

Transaction costs are costs incurred to acquire or dispose financial assets or liabilities at fair value through profit or loss. They include fees and commissions paid to agents, advisors, brokers, and dealers. Transaction costs, when incurred, are immediately recognised in the statement of comprehensive income as expenses.

(i) Unit holders' contributions

The unit holders' contributions to the Fund meet the criteria to be classified as equity instruments under MFRS 132 "Financial Instruments: Presentation". Those criteria include:

- the units entitle the holder to a proportionate share of the Fund's NAV;
- the units are the most subordinated class and class features are identical:
- there is no contractual obligations to deliver cash or another financial asset other than the obligation on the Fund to repurchase; and
- the total expected cash flows from the units over its life are based substantially on the profit or loss of the Fund.

The outstanding units are carried at the redemption amount that is payable at each financial year if unit holder exercises the right to put the unit back to the Fund.

Units are created and cancelled at prices based on the Fund's NAV per unit at the time of creation or cancellation. The Fund's NAV per unit is calculated by dividing the net assets attributable to unit holders with the total number of outstanding units.

(j) Amount due from/to stockbrokers

Amounts due from/to stockbrokers represent receivables for Shariah-compliant quoted securities sold and payables for Shariah-compliant quoted securities purchased that have been contracted for but not yet settled or delivered on the statement of financial position date respectively.

(k) Realised and unrealised portions of profit or loss after tax

The analysis of realised and unrealised profit or loss after tax as presented on the statement of comprehensive income is prepared in accordance with GUTF.

(I) Critical accounting estimates and judgements in applying accounting policies

The Fund makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, rarely equal the related actual results. To enhance the information content of the estimates, certain key variables that are anticipated to have material impact to the Funds' results and financial position are tested for sensitivity to changes in the underlying parameters.

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated by the Manager and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Estimate of fair value of unquoted Sukuk

In undertaking any of the Fund's Shariah-compliant investment, the Manager will ensure that all assets of the Fund under management will be valued appropriately, that is at fair value and in compliance with the GUTF.

Ringgit-denominated unquoted Sukuk are valued using fair value prices quoted by a BPA. Where the Manager is of the view that the price quoted by BPA for a specific unquoted Sukuk differs from the market price by more than 20 bps, the Manager may use market price, provided that the Manager records its basis for using a non-BPA price, obtains necessary internal approvals to use the non-BPA price, and keeps an audit trail of all decisions and basis for adopting the use of non-BPA price.

All liabilities are financial liabilities which are carried at amortised cost.

The investment objective of the Fund is to achieve consistent capital growth over the medium to long-term.

The Fund is exposed to a variety of risks which include market risk (inclusive of price risk and interest rate risk), credit risk and liquidity risk.

Financial risk management is carried out through internal control process adopted by the Manager and adherence to the investment restrictions as stipulated in the Deeds and GUTF.

(a) Market risk

(i) Price risk

Price risk is the risk that the fair value of Shariah-compliant investments in quoted securities and unquoted Sukuk will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk). The value of Shariah-compliant quoted securities and unquoted Sukuk may fluctuate according to the activities of individual companies, sector and overall political and economic conditions. Such fluctuation may cause the Fund's NAV and prices of units to fall as well as rise, and income produced by the Fund may also fluctuate.

The price risk is managed through diversification and selection of Shariah-compliant quoted securities, unquoted Sukuk and other financial instruments within specified limits according to the Deeds.

The Fund is exposed to price risk arising from profit rate fluctuation in relation to its investments of Nil (2022: RM448,222) in unquoted Sukuk. The Fund's exposure to price risk arising from profit rate fluctuation and the related sensitivity analysis are disclosed in "interest rate risk".

(ii) Interest rate risk

In general, when profit rates rise, unquoted Sukuk prices will tend to fall and vice versa. Therefore, the NAV of the Fund may also tend to fall when profit rates rise or are expected to rise. However, investors should be aware that should the Fund holds an unquoted Sukuk till maturity, such price fluctuations would dissipate as it approaches maturity, and thus the growth of the NAV shall not be affected at maturity. In order to mitigate profit rates exposure of the Fund, the Manager will manage the duration of the portfolio via shorter or longer tenured assets depending on the view of the future profit rate trend of the Manager, which is based on its continuous fundamental research and analysis.

Investors should note that the movement in prices of unquoted Sukuk and Shariah-compliant money market instruments are benchmarked against profit rates. As such, the investments are exposed to the movement of the profit rates. However, it does not in any way suggest that this Fund will invest in conventional financial instruments. All investments carried out for the Fund including placement and deposits are in accordance with Shariah.

This risk is crucial since unquoted Sukuk portfolio management depends on forecasting profit rate movements. Prices of unquoted Sukuk move inversely to profit rate movements, therefore as profit rates rise, the prices of unquoted Sukuk decrease and vice versa. Furthermore, unquoted Sukuk with longer maturity and lower yield profit/coupon rates are more susceptible to profit rate movements.

(a) Market risk (continued)

(ii) Interest rate risk (continued)

Such investments may be subject to unanticipated rise in profit rates which may impair the ability of the issuers to meet the obligation under the instrument, especially if the issuers are highly leveraged. An increase in profit rates may therefore increase the potential for default by an issuer.

The table below summarises the sensitivity of the Fund's profit or loss and NAV to movements in prices of unquoted Sukuk held by the Fund as a result of movement in profit rate. The analysis is based on the assumptions that the profit rate changed by 1% with all other variables held constant. This represents management's best estimate of a reasonable possible shift in the profit rate, having regard to the historical volatility of the profit rate.

(b) Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty will default on its contractual obligation resulting in financial loss to the Fund.

Investment in unquoted Sukuk may involve a certain degree of credit/default risk with regards to the issuers. Generally, credit risk or default risk is the risk of loss due to the issuer's non-payment or untimely payment of the investment amount as well as the returns on investment. This will cause a decline in value of the defaulted unquoted Sukuk and subsequently depress the NAV of the Fund. Usually credit risk is more apparent for an investment with a longer tenure, i.e. the longer the duration, the higher the credit risk.

Credit risk can be managed by performing continuous fundamental credit research and analysis to ascertain the creditworthiness of its issuer. In addition, the Manager imposes a minimum rating requirement as rated by either local and/or foreign rating agencies and manages the duration of the investment in accordance with the objective of the Fund. For this Fund, the unquoted Sukuk investment must satisfy a minimum credit requirement of at least "A3" or "P2" by RAM or equivalent rating by MARC or by local rating agency(ies) of the country of issuance; "BBB-" by S&P or equivalent rating by Moody's or Fitch.

(b) Credit risk (continued)

The credit risk arising from placements of Shariah-compliant deposits in licensed Islamic financial institutions is managed by ensuring that the Fund will only place Shariah-compliant deposits in reputable licensed Islamic financial institutions

For the amount due from Manager, the settlement terms of the proceeds from the creation of units receivable from the Manager are governed by the GUTF.

For amount due from stockbrokers, the settlement terms are governed by the relevant rules and regulations as prescribed by respective stock exchange. The credit risk is minimal as all transactions in Shariah-compliant quoted securities are settled/paid upon delivery using approved stockbrokers.

All deposits with licensed financial institutions of the Fund have an average remaining maturity of 1 day (2022: 1 day).

(c) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund will encounter difficulty in meeting its financial obligations.

The Manager manages this risk by maintaining sufficient level of liquid assets to meet anticipated payments and cancellations of the units by unit holders. Liquid assets comprise bank balances and Shariah-compliant deposits with licensed Islamic financial institutions which are capable of being converted into cash within 7 business days. Generally, all investments are subject to a certain degree of liquidity risk depending on the nature of the investment instruments, market, sector and other factors.

(c) Liquidity risk (continued)

For the purpose of the Fund, the Manager will attempt to balance the entire portfolio by investing in a mix of assets with satisfactory trading volume and those that occasionally could encounter poor liquidity. This is expected to reduce the risks for the entire portfolio without limiting the Fund's growth potentials.

(d) Capital risk management

The capital of the Fund is net assets attributable to unit holders of RM1,507,998,065 (2022: RM1,813,483,775). The amount of capital can change significantly on a daily basis as the Fund is subject to daily subscriptions and redemptions at the discretion of unit holders. The Fund's objective when managing capital is to safeguard the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern in order to provide returns to unit holders and benefits for other stakeholders and to maintain a strong capital base to support the development of the investment activities of the Fund.

(e) Fair value estimation

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date (i.e. an exit price).

(e) Fair value estimation (continued)

The fair value of financial assets traded in active markets (such as trading securities) are based on quoted market prices at the close of trading on the financial year end date. The Fund utilises the last traded market price for financial assets where the last traded price falls within the bid-ask spread. In circumstances where the last traded price is not within the bid-ask spread, the Manager will determine the point within the bid-ask spread that is most representative of the fair value.

An active market is a market in which transactions for the asset or liability take place with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis.

The fair value of financial assets that are not traded in an active market is determined by using valuation techniques.

(i) Fair value hierarchy

The table below analyses financial instruments carried at fair value. The different levels have been defined as follows:

- Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active market for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1)
- Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (that is, as prices) or indirectly (that is, derived from prices) (Level 2)
- Inputs for the asset and liability that are not based on observable market data (that is, unobservable inputs) (Level 3)

The level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirety is determined on the basis of the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety. For this purpose, the significance of an input is assessed against the fair value measurement in its entirety.

If a fair value measurement uses observable inputs that require significant adjustment based on unobservable inputs, that measurement is a Level 3 measurement.

Assessing the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement in its entirety requires judgement, considering factors specific to the asset or liability.

The determination of what constitutes 'observable' requires significant judgement by the Fund. The Fund considers observable data to be that market data that is readily available, regularly distributed or updated, reliable and verifiable, not proprietary, and provided by independent sources that are actively involved in the relevant market.

Shariah-compliant investments whose values are based on quoted market prices in active markets, and are therefore classified within Level 1, include active listed equities. The Fund does not adjust the quoted prices for these instruments. The Fund's policies on valuation of these financial assets are stated in Note 2(b).

Financial instruments that trade in markets that are not considered to be active but are valued based on quoted market prices, dealer quotations or alternative pricing sources supported by observable inputs are classified within Level 2. This includes unquoted Sukuk.

As Level 2 instruments include positions that are not traded in active markets and/or are subject to transfer restrictions, valuations may be adjusted to reflect illiquidity and/or non-transferability, which are generally based on available market information. The Fund's policies on valuation of these financial assets are stated in Note 2(b).

(ii) The carrying values of cash and cash equivalents, amount due from stockbrokers, amount due from Manager, dividends receivable and all current liabilities are a reasonable approximation of their fair values due to their short-term nature.

4. MANAGEMENT FEE

In accordance with the Deeds, the Manager is entitled to a maximum management fee of 2.25% per annum, calculated daily based on the NAV of the Fund.

For the financial year ended 31 May 2023, the management fee was recognised at a rate of 1.50% per annum (2022: 1.50% per annum).

There was no further liability to the Manager in respect of management fee other than amounts recognised above.

5. TRUSTEE FEE

In accordance with the Deeds, the Trustee is entitled to a maximum fee of 0.06% per annum, calculated daily based on the NAV of the Fund.

For the financial year ended 31 May 2023, the Trustee fee was recognised at a rate of 0.06% per annum (2022: 0.06% per annum).

There was no further liability to the Trustee in respect of Trustee fee other than amounts recognised above.

Exceptions to investment spread limits

Government and other public Shariah-compliant securities or Islamic money market instruments

- (10) The single issuer limit in (3) may be raised to 35% of the Fund's NAV if the issuing entity is, or the issue is guaranteed by, either a foreign government, foreign government agency, foreign central bank or supranational, that has a minimum long-term credit rating of investment grade (including gradation and subcategories) by an international rating agency.
- (11) Where the single issuer limit is increased to 35% of the Fund's NAV, the single issuer aggregate limit in (5) may be raised, subject to the group limit in (8) not exceeding 35% of the Fund's NAV.

Islamic Deposits

- (12) The single financial institution limit in (4) does not apply to placements of Islamic Deposits arising from:
 - (a) subscription monies received prior to the commencement of investment by the Fund;
 - (b) liquidation of investments prior to the termination or maturity of the Fund, where the placement of Islamic Deposits with various financial institutions would not be in the best interests of Unit holders; or
 - (c) monies held for the settlement of redemption or other payment obligations, where the placement of Islamic Deposits with various financial institutions would not be in the best interests of Unit holders

The global exposure of the Funds is calculated based on the following:

Commitment approach

The global exposure of the Funds to Islamic derivatives is calculated as the sum of the:

- absolute value of the exposure of each individual Islamic derivative not involved in netting or hedging arrangements;
- absolute value of the net exposure of each individual Islamic derivative after netting or hedging arrangement; and
- the values of cash collateral received pursuant to:
- (i) the reduction of exposure to counterparties of OTC Islamic derivatives; and
- (ii) efficient portfolio management techniques relating to securities lending and repurchase transactions (if applicable).

Netting arrangements

Netting arrangements may be taken into account to reduce the Fund's exposure to Islamic derivatives.

The Fund may net positions between:

- (a) Islamic derivatives on the same underlying constituents, even if the maturity dates are different; or
- (b) Islamic derivatives and the same corresponding underlying constituents, if those underlying constituents are Shariah-compliant transferable securities, Islamic money market instruments, or units or shares in Islamic collective investment schemes.

Hedging arrangements

Hedging arrangements may be taken into account to reduce the Fund's exposure to Islamic derivatives.

The marked-to-market value of Shariah-compliant transferable securities, Islamic money market instruments, or units or shares in Islamic collective investment schemes involved in hedging arrangements may be taken into account to reduce the exposure of the Fund to Islamic derivatives.

The hedging arrangement must:

- (a) not be aimed at generating a return;
- (b) result in an overall verifiable reduction of the risk of the Funds;
- (c) offset the general and specific risks linked to the underlying constituent being hedged;
- (d) relate to the same asset class being hedged; and
- (e) be able to meet its hedging objective in all market conditions.

Note: The above restrictions and limits do not apply to Shariah-compliant instruments issued or guaranteed by the Malaysian government or BNM.

Note 1:

Not applicable for iLI-ES and iLI-S. Instead, the following apply:

- (17) The value of the Fund's investments in Sukuk and Islamic Money Market Instruments issued by any single issuer must not exceed 20% of the Fund's NAV ("single issuer limit"). In determining the single issuer limit, the value of the fund's investments in instruments in (1) by the same issuer must be included in the calculation.
- (18) The single issuer limit in (16) may be increased to 30% if the Sukuk are rated by any Malaysian or global rating agency to have the highest long-term credit rating.
- (19) Where the single issuer limit is increased to 30% pursuant to (17), the single issuer aggregate limit of 25% in (5) may be raised to 30% of the fund's NAV.
- (20) The value of the Fund's investments in Sukuk and Islamic Money Market Instruments issued by any group of companies must not exceed 30% of the Fund's NAV. In determining the group limit, the value of the fund's investments in instruments in (1) issued by the issuers within the same group of companies must be included in the calculation.

(21) Where the Sukuk or Islamic Money Market Instruments are issued, or the issue is guaranteed by, either a foreign government, foreign government agency, foreign central bank or supranational, that has a minimum long-term credit rating of investment grade (including gradation and subcategories) by an international rating agency, the fund manager may apply the limits in paragraphs (9) and (10).

In respect of the above investment restrictions and limits, the GUTF provides that any breach of the restrictions and limits due to appreciation or depreciation in value of the Fund's investments, repurchase of units or payment made out of the Fund, or change in capital of a corporation in which the Fund has invested in, or downgrade in or cessation of a credit rating need not be reported to the SC but we must rectify as soon as practicable within three (3) months from the date of breach unless stated otherwise in the GUTF. However, the three-month period may be extended if it is in the best interest of Unit holders and Trustee's consent is obtained. Such extension must be subject to at least a monthly review by the trustee.

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
